

Govt-At-Your-Doorstep Initiative Ensures Essential Birth Registrations of Nirankhal's Wanarmare Tribals

Nirankhal: Human Touch Foundation, in collaboration with Sanvedan Kendra, has successfully organized a pioneering delayed birth registration camp for the nomadic tribal Kalkhari-Wanarmare community at Nirankhal. This unique initiative, supported by the students of the Social Work Programme, Goa University, the Goa State Commission for Protection of Child Rights, and the Sub Divisional Magistrate, Ponda, embodies the spirit of the 'Sarkar Tumchya Dari' (government at your doorstep) initiative.

By bringing essential services directly to the community, this program significantly simplifies the often complex and bureaucratic processes, making it easier for residents to obtain critical documentation. The effort, which involved delayed birth registration of around 88 residents including children, was facilitated under the oversight of Sub Divisional Magistrate Ponda, Shubham Naik, and Secretary of the Village Panchayat Betora-Nirankhal-Conzem-Codar. The camp received legal support from Adv. Caroline Colasso and Adv. Vijeta.

This initiative was initiated during the term of Peter F. Borges as Chairperson of the Goa State Commission for Protection of Child Rights and was brought to



fruition with substantial contributions from law student volunteers from G. R. Kare College of Law, Margao.

New lease of life for Wanarmare tribe

Camp held in Nirankhal for birth registration of members

Members of the Wanarmare (Makadmare) tribe, who were neglected by the government authorities for long, have now received a new lease of life with the South Goa administration holding a special drive on Friday to give them a hearing on their delayed birth registration.

Around 88 members of the tribe, including some as old as 63 and as young as 3 will be provided birth registration certificates for which the process has been initiated.

Birth of members of the tribe was never registered earlier, thus denying them the benefits of various government welfare schemes and facilities.

Speaking about the programme, tribe leader Gopal Pawar said, "This camp has been a beacon of hope for our community. For the first time, we feel the government is reaching out to us directly and addressing our needs. The initiative will help many of us secure our identities and access the benefits we deserve. We are grateful to everyone involved in making this possible."

The initiative was taken up by NGOs Human Touch Foundation and Sanvedan Kendra. They organised the delayed birth registration camp for the nomadic tribal community of Wanarmare at Nirankhal, Behoda in Ponda taluka where the tribe members reside. The initiative was sup-

Birth registration camp proves beneficial for Wanarmare community

88 members from marginalised community to get birth certificates; initiative will help secure identities, access to social benefits

MARGAO: The Kalkhari-Wanarmare community in Nirankhal, benefited from a significant birth registration camp, ensuring that 88 residents, including children, received their essential birth certificates. This effort, held in collaboration with local organizations and government bodies, aimed to simplify the complex processes involved in obtaining critical documentation for this nomadic tribal community.

This initiative was part of the 'Sarkar Tumchya Dari' (government at your doorstep) programme, which seeks to bring essential services directly to marginalized communities. The camp was overseen by Sub Divisional Magistrate (SDM) Ponda, Shubham Naik, and supported by the Goa State Commission for Protection of Child Rights (GSCPCR) and various legal professionals.

88 of Makadmare tribe finally get to register births

Margao: Eighty-eight people of the Makadmare (Wanarmare) tribe residing at Nirankhal, Ponda, registered their births at the 'delayed birth registration' camp on Friday. The move assumes significance as in the absence of a birth certificate, the basic identity document, they would have a hard time establishing their existence.

While the adults would remain deprived of various welfare schemes, the children — who did not have institutional births — were unable to gain admissions as schools demanded their birth certificates.

The camp was conducted by the South Goa district administration and facilitated by Human Touch Foundation, in collaboration

with Sanvedan Kendra. The initiative was also supported by the students of the social work programme of Goa University, and the Goa State Commission for Protection of Child Rights.

Additional collector-I, Srinet Kothwale, told TOI that the district administration has identified certain vulnerable groups whose births and deaths have not been registered with the authorities within the statutory period specified in the Registration of Births and Deaths Act. "The district collector has been vested with the powers to enable the delayed registration of births and deaths in such cases," Kothwale said. "Another such camp has been planned at Salcete for the benefit of another vulnerable community."
